The institution is steadily moving from the traditional to automated Management Information Systems (MIS). The following systems are fully functional in the Institute from last few years.

CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. *Explain in 500 words*

The College ensures the process of completion of curriculum within the stipulated time to attain the programme outcomes effectively preparing a comprehensive academic calendarbefore the commencement the new academic session and sharing with all stakeholders. The academic calendar notifies the teaching days, dates of internal and probable external exams, college activities, college events, public holidays and term-breaks.

The allocation of subjects and workload for all faculties is determined in the departmental meetings for the forthcoming semester in advance. Based on this each teacher prepares lesson plans mentioning the number of lectures to be taken for each unit in the syllabus in their special attendance diaries printed by the college. These lesson plans are strictly adhered and strict supervision by the concerned head of the department helps in the successful completion of the syllabus.

Departmental timetable committee prepares the master class routine which strictly conforms to the credit points mentioned in the syllabus prescribed by the University. Department shares their timetables with each other avoid clashes with respect to allotment of classrooms. The timetables are uploaded on the college website and the laboratory timetables are displayed in the labs.

Orientation/induction programme is organized for the newly admitted students to make them aware of the mechanism for curriculum delivery, examination and rules and regulation of the college. For students of the intermediate semesters (2nd and 3rd year), a re-orientation session is held. Lecture plans and timetables are shared with students.

Along with the traditional chalk and talk method, infrastructure for the use of ICT in classrooms, like power point presentations, audio-visual support is all available to make the delivery of the curriculum enabling and interesting for the students. Under continuous internal evaluation (CIE), one class test is held after 8-10 weeks as mentioned in the academic calendar. Teachers also take assignments (minimum two) in various forms (report writing, quizzes, bulletin boards, MCQs, etc) per subject per semester. Internal assessment is done transparently and the examined answer scripts and allotment of marks for assignments and practical classes are shown to students.

In some departments, bridge courses, remedial classes are held in order to make the curriculum delivery more holistic, effective and designed to meet the gap between the expectations of the course and academic standing of the students. Post-graduate students are specially trained to handle assignments, open-house seminars and dissertation to prepare them for academic research. Interactive sessions with students and, sometimes with guardians are held to identify problem areas. Field visits and excursions are organized by all the departments to ensure effective implementation of the prescribed curriculum. Special lectures on topics outside the curriculum, workshops on skill enhancement and other college co and extra-curricular activities help in the holistic growth of every student.

1.4.2 How the feedback obtained is being analysed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (Maximum 500 words)

Feedback is collected from all stakeholders (students, teachers, employers and occasionally from alumni and parents).

Feedback on faculty is collected from students twice in an academic session after the end of each semester by an external agency. This feedback for each subject taught by a teacher is statistically analyzed and a copy of the feedback is shared with the concerned faculty. The feedback is also discussed at the time of Principal's appraisal with each faculty. The progress is monitored in the subsequent appraisal session.

Feedback on institutional data is also collected from outgoing final year students and analysed. Records are maintained with the Principal and IQAC. Feedback on all activities conducted by the college is also collected and used to make future plans.

Feedback from teachers is collected in the form PBAS forms under CAS submitted at the end of each academic session. Annual appraisals are done by the Principal in the presence of the HoD where the Principal addresses possible areas of improvement. Monetary awards along with a trophy and certificate is given to teachers for their exceptional performance each year by the Management during the occasion of teacher's day celebrations. Outstanding performance of Group-D staff is also recognized and the best-staff is awarded on the Annual Day of the college.

Employers submit an assessment sheet for each students undertaking internship at their organizations. This helps to identify areas in the academic process of the college that need attentions and improvements. Also, good relations between the placement officer and the recruiting agencies allow the college to get direct feedback from the employers.

Some parent teachers' meetings are held and feedback collected verbally from parents.

Though a system of formal mentoring system is yet to be implemented in all departments of the college, all faculty members maintain a close rapport with the students and assist them improving academic performance, exploring career prospects and resolving personal issues. Teachers also motivate students to pursue higher studies and instil a spirit of entrepreneurship in them. They provide necessary advice and support for improvement in academic performances of students. The mentor-mentee relationship in the college is fostered through the following available opportunities and prospects:

- All whole-time faculty of the Institute are available to students every day during college hours and many guide students beyond the college hours. The college Principal is accessible.
- A host of co-curricular or extra co-curricular activities encourage participative learning and team work besides again giving opportunities to students for interacting with the supervising faculty. Close and lifelong bonding between the teachers and students is fostered during planning and execution of these activities.
- Educational excursions undertaken by students outside the city and accompanied by faculty offers opportunity for students and faculty to interact and bond.
- Field visits also provide informal opportunity between teachers and pupils for interaction beyond the classroom.
- Students are allocated personal mentors/supervisor for their dissertation, projects, term papers and seminars. This strengthens bonds between students their supervisors and allows the supervisor to understand the student's needs as informal mentors.
- The college has appointed a dedicated personal counsellor who has been entrusted
 with the task of constantly monitoring and guiding the students and resolving their
 personal issues.
- A Grievance Redressal Cell has been set up for attending to and resolving complaints from students.

2.5.2 Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The internal evaluation for various courses and programmes is done as per the guidelines prescribed by the affiliating university. Continuous internal evaluation carried a weightage of 40% for each course and is conducted the form of one written class test (dates for which are notified in the Academic Calendar) and assignments given by the subject teacher. Different components for continuous assessment are well defined and teachers can undertake evaluation of performance and knowledge imbibed in the form of MCQs, project reports, presentations, seminars, quizzes etc. keeping in mind the learning outcomes desired. Importance is also given to regular attendance and class performance wherever required. The cumulative attendance is updated and put-up on the notice board every month. An internal report card is generated at the end of each semester and given to students for their records.

The end-semester University Examination with a 60% weightage is held at the end of every semester by the University.

Evaluation of sessional papers like seminars, term papers, projects and dissertations have been streamlined and a marking system with break-up of marks defined. Revision lectures and remedial coaching are also conducted to help the students understand previously taught topics. Parents are also kept in the loop about their wards performance, through periodic parent teacher meeting (PTM) for those students having shortfall in attendance.

Students' grievance related to exams is dealt with promptly.

2.5.3 Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of examination and other related matters (250 words)

Academic Calendar is prepared by the institution before the commencement of a new session. The calendar follows the timelines/guidelines and academic schedule of the affiliating University and is prepared under the active supervision of the HoDs and the IQAC coordinator. After finalization and accepted by the HoD Forum, it is published on institute's website and also displayed on various notice boards of the college to enable staff and students to plan and prepare accordingly. The Calendar is printed in all departmental prospectuses that is updated every year. The annual academic calendar highlights teaching days in both the semesters, days for internal and end-semester examination, college events, public holidays and term breaks. Based on the calendar, each department prepares its teaching plan and activity schedules.

4.4.2 Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (*maximum* 500 words) (information to be available in institutional Website, provide link)

Before the commencement of every financial year, the Institute sets budgetary provisions under various headings for maintaining and utilising the campus infrastructure facilities. The Principal collects requirements from all department heads, laboratory assistants and officers, and prepares a proposal before the end of a financial year and discusses it with the Secretary General of the sponsoring Trust in the presence of the Accounts officer to finalise the budget for the forthcoming session.

Funds are allocated under the following heads — block & equipments; repairs & maintenance; IT related expenditure; books & journals (for library); examination related expenses; advertisement & PR; printing; stationery and sundry; research (seed money); faculty development activities; conferences, seminars & lectures; and college functions and activities and others. Funds are utilized as per the sanctioned budget with the Principal as the main approving authority. For each matter, requisition along with proposals are placed before the Principal, and after verification by the Accounts officer, it is approved.

For maintenance and optimal utilization of the physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, computers, classrooms etc., the college has a number of officers and personals appointed, and several maintenance contracts signed with different vendors. Under these contracts, regular upkeep of the machines, equipments, gadgets and services is done. Equipments at the laboratories that are not covered under 16 number of formal AMCs are checked before the commencement of the academic session; problems, if found, are recorded and after necessary discussion with the Principal, they are serviced. Outsourcing is done for maintenance and repairing of IT infrastructure such as computers, internet facilities including Wi-Fi and broadband. Updating of softwares is done by lab assistants.

Maintenance pertaining to infrastructure such as buildings, classroom rooms, furniture and fixtures, electrical fittings and plumbing are supervised by the Maintenance Supervisor under instruction by the Administrative officer. Complaints are noted in the Maintenance Complaint Register on regular basis and actions taken after necessary discussion with the Principal. Regular cleaning of water tanks, proper garbage disposal, pest control, landscaping and maintenance of lawns is done by Institute Fourth Class Employees. Regular maintenance of the water cooler and water purifier is done by outsourcing agent.

Six full-time lab assistants have been appointed to look after the upkeep of the different

laboratories. For supervision of other IT-related infrastructure, an IT-Manger is appointed and under an AMC, hardware personnel are available on all days during college hours. Full-time librarians and assistants look after the LRC. All are supported by a fleet of full-time group-D staff.

Annual stock checking through physically verification of all items and resources is carried out at the end of each academic session by the lab assistants and librarians who also maintain stock registers. Department wise annual stock verification is done by concerned Head of the Department.

5.3.2 Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

The college involves the students who are its primary stake holders to in most facets of its functioning and in such spheres of activity which are statutorily permissible. Students can be members of several college Clubs and exhibit their skills and talents. They are given platforms to share their feedbacks, views, suggestions, opinions and grievances if any.

The Institute has two students' representative bodies which play an important role in maintaining a collaborative relationship between the students on one hand, and the faculty and management on the other. The two bodies are Students' Administrative Body (SAB) and Students' Council Body (SCB). Both the two bodies are completely apolitical. The members of the SAB are called the Class Representatives (CR) and each represents a particular class / year of a department. The CR coordinates class activities and college events and other student-driven activities and contributes to the smooth running of the activities.

The SCB members form the highest representative body for the students at the Institute. A SCB member represents a particular class/year of either the Science or the Commerce departments. They directly report to the Principal.

At the Management Campus, there is a Students' Council comprising of class representatives (CRS) and assistant class representative (ACRs). Students from each class/section elect one CR and one ACR from among its ranks. The CRs and ACRs liaison on behalf of the class with the faculty and the management. They help in coordinating and organizing student-driven activities.

Students' representation on various academic and administrative bodies is also in place. Students are included as student-editors in the Editorial Board for the College Magazine (Main Campus) and Newsletter (Management Campus). Student representation is a must in activity related committees for celebratory days like Independence Day, Republic Day and Basant Panchami.

Students play a very crucial role in organizing inter-college fests, namely, Commercio Conclave and Verve (Main Campus), and Invictus (at the Management Campus). They form their own committees/groups to oversee all aspects of the event - from funding, planning and organizing, corporate communication and operations and guided by a faculty group. The success of all student driven activities depends on their administrative acumen and contribution.

5.4 Alumni Engagement

The Institute has a registered alumni association (Registration of the MOA of Association was done with the Office of Registrar of Firms, Societies & Non-trading corporations, West Bengal in 2004) under the name of Smt. J.D. Birla Institute. The Institute has since been rechristened twice to Smt. J.D. Birla Institute in 2005, and finally to J.D. Birla Institute in 2010.

The Alumni Association provides an informal database of students' progression during interactions. The alumni progression is tracked and recorded through the alumni association. The Alumni Association runs with a peer team which includes President (Alumni), Vice President, Secretary, Joint Secretary and Treasurer. The Principal is an ex officio president of the association and an alumnus of the Institute. The secretary of the association is also a faculty member of the institution. This helps in taking the right and timely decisions.

There are currently over 1742 members of the association and 12- elected executive member who oversees the functioning of the Association.

The Alumni are even invited as resource person for conducting seminars, workshops and guest lectures and contributes to the development of the Institute. Many of the alumni are well placed and some recruit/or employ students as interns in their organizations. Alumni members also help in organizing events and occasionally sponsor events or provide funds.

CRITERION-VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

JDBI JDBI follows a decentralised and participatory management strategy. The College has a defined organisational structure that includes several bodies and committees, with well defined processes and roles for members. Regular participatory meetings are arranged for everyone to discuss, suggest and voice concerns.

PRACTICE-I: Hierarchical Division of Work

The Institute's top management offers the Principal complete autonomy and flexibility in leading all academic and administrative activities. The Institute follows a hierarchical system of governance under guidance from the Governing Body. The Governing Body meets at regular intervals and takes the necessary steps to identify future goals and ensures prompt execution of the targets set.

The Institute has six academic departments, each of which is led by a Head who is also a whole-time permanent faculty of the concerned department of the Institute. Heads of Departments discharge their duties with respect to the academic matters of their respective departments under well defined roles and responsibilities. They report directly to the Principal and at the same time, they have the authority to take suitable academic decisions suited to their respective needs. The Heads of Departments hold regular departmental meetings with all their departmental faculties to discuss matters pertaining to their department as per their individual needs. All academic activities are conducted as per the academic calendar and for conducting other co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, matters after discussion with departmental faculties is finalized by the HoD Forum comprising of all the HoDs in the presence of the Principal. Following this, a planreport is presented by the concerned HoD to the Principal for her consideration. The Principal constitutes a Special Committee as recommended by the HoD Forum, for execution of the activity and this committee has to submit an action taken report after the activity is over.

Some non-statutory committees (Library Advisory Committee, Research Committee, Admission Committee, and Examination Committee) have also been constituted for smooth execution of Academic matters. Recommendations by these committees are taken into account while making decisions.

PRACTICE-2: Participatory Decision Making through College Committees

At the core of this decentralized process, is the statutory HoD Forum (de facto the Academic Council) of which all Heads of Departments are the members. Several committees undertake different college activities: Admission Committee, Examination Committee, Time Table Committee, Research Committee, LRC Committee, Sports Committee, Cultural Committee. Apart from these committees, other committees are also formed by the Principal for carrying out

college activities that involve both academic and administrative processes and are overseen by nominated teacher in-charges who carry out the activities as they see fit after consulting with students and other college teachers and personnel. It is ensured that there is all round participation of students and leadership and organizational activities is encouraged by the committees.

The college also has a Student Council body & Students Administrative body that are proactive in bringing the student issues to the concerned authorities and assists in bridging the gap between the administration and the students.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following (with in 100 words each):

Curriculum Development

The College is affiliated to Jadavpur University and strictly follows the syllabus of University for all the Undergraduate and Postgraduate courses. Every 3-5 years, the Institute updates their curriculum. Feedback is gathered from students, alumni, and industry professionals and revisions are made to match industry demands. College faculty collaborate with professionals in the area to build curricula for value-added and bridge courses offered by various departments.

Teaching and Learning

Before the semester begins, each faculty member prepares subject wise lecture plans based on the curriculum. The concerned HoDs checks for adherence to the lecture plans fortnightly. Students' attendance in class and participation in assignments are rigorously tracked. Outside of class, students are encouraged to approach their lecturers for clarification on specific elements of the course. Teachers are urged to keep up to date and use an ICT-based approach to teaching and learning. For this the IT infrastructure at the college is well-maintained and augmented from time to time.

Every year IQAC of the college organizes professional development programmes for teaching staff of the college to orient them on latest teaching technologies methodologies. IQAC of the college monitors the teaching and learning process by collecting students' feedback on every teacher of the institution. Reports showing the students feedback on their teachers were distributed to all the teachers individually through head of the institution in one to one interaction. Principal appreciate teachers having positive impressive feedback and motivate other teachers to improve and overcome their weaknesses as shared by the students through feedback. Awards are also constituted by the college management to motivate the faculty to excel.

Examination and Evaluation

Despite the fact that the examination process is governed by the norms of the affiliating university, the college has a defined internal protocol for all examination-related duties. The Principal oversees and supervises all associated activities, with active assistance from examination officials. The College conducts internal class tests and class assignment for all

programmes as a part of continuous internal evaluation. The timelines for the same are reflected in the Academic Calendar prepared at the beginning of each academic session. Performance of the students is evaluated on the basis of internal tests, term end-semester examinations and Subject specific project assigned to them. The performance outcomes of all assessments are shown to the students in a transparent manner and their grievances, if any are addressed.

Research and Development

All faculties are encouraged to participate in research and development at the Institute. They are motivated to present papers in National and International conferences and to publish books and research papers in peer reviewed journals with impact factor. A Research Committee convened by a faculty member oversees the adherence to all ethical norms in research and provides guidance for improvement in any specific area.

Two teachers were encouraged through cash award, trophy and certificate for publishing minimum two papers in reputed peer reviewed journals.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

Use of ICT is promoted in library which is automated. To introduce and encourage students to use books and e-resources, the librarian conducts orientation sessions at the start of every academic session for the newly admitted students. The Learning Resource Centre (LRC) of the Main campus organized a two day book exhibition-cum-sale on 23rd & 24th November, 2017 at the Institute premises.

A large number of books on a wide variety of subjects were exhibited by 17 leading publishers, distributors and sellers not only from the city but also from the national capital.

Human Resource Management

The HoD Forum of the institute analyses the manpower need of the institution at the beginning of every academic year. Applications of qualified candidates are invited through advertisements on the vacant posts in local and national newspapers as well as the college website. Panel interviews are conducted for shortlisted candidates. Candidates are also called for demo lectures. Selection of the candidate is done by the interviewing panel comprising of two external experts.

Regular meetings were held with teachers and staff to resolve issues and matters. Faculty members were urged to plan for promotions and submit applications through CAS.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Efforts are made to establish and maintain positive relationships with a variety of organisations and companies, as well as to form collaborative industry-academic alliances. Internships are available at reputable companies. Students are exposed to industry knowledge through lectures, workshops, and field trips, among other activities. With an objective to improve employability of students, speakers from industries are invited to interact with them, and conduct seminars / workshops. This gives pupils a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to apply theoretical topics in a practical setting. Memorandums of Understanding (MoU) have been established with institutes, with the component of learning focusing on the application of theory in an authentic industry situation. In collaboration with industries, the placement cell organises career assistance and counselling, as well as campus interviews. The Institute welcomes feedback and support from the industry.

Admission of Students

Every year the members of the admission committee of the Institute complete the admission

work efficiently in fair manner. To make the admission process flawless every year all the members of admission committee are oriented about the admission process norms to be followed while admitting students in the institution. To make admission process smooth apart from displaying detailed admission notices volunteers are made available adjacent to reception to direct guide parents and students visiting institution for admission purpose.

Regular contact with candidates is maintained through telephone and email and their problems were addressed.

6.2.2 Implementation of e-governance in areas of operations:

Planning and Development

The departments of the College are provided with internet connections with access to emails. Important correspondences related to day to day work are communicated through emails. Every department maintains depository of documents related to the record of the students, staff members and the activities and programmes of the department. The management keeps in touch with the institutional head and give suggestions through various visits to college.

Administration

The Management, Principal, teaching and non-teaching staff members interact through emails for the day to day functioning and allocation of work. Office uses LAN based software system for faster communication. Records are kept in physical and digital formats for easy retrieval and storage. The Library and Examination department uses IT based facilities for their day to day functioning very effectively.

Finance and Accounts

All financial information is maintained through Tally. Record of the students is maintained in digital format. The salaries records of the staff are maintained by the accounts department in excel sheets and the information is commonly shared through email with staff whenever required.

Student Admission and Support

The admission process in the College is governed by the extant rules, regulations and guidelines of the Jadavpur University. The website provides students with easy access to information on rules and regulations, faculties, and student support services placement activities. Emails are used to provide support to students during the admissions process. A separate section on Admission was created on the institutional website to disseminate guidelines and relevant information regarding the admission process. Academic support and remedial coaching is provided to weak students. Freeship is provided to the financially/economically weak and scholarship to the toppers in the final year. Psychological counselling and career counselling as provided to all students.

Examination

While the University is in charge of the examination schedule, the College takes proactive steps to ensure that students receive appropriate and timely information. Notifications about the examination, such as the submission of the examination form and the examination date, are posted on the college website in a timely manner. Students are also informed about the collecting of internal assessment report cards, admission cards, grade cards, degree certificates, and other examination-related requirements via internet means. Similarly, all faculty members are informed of their examination responsibilities. Internal assessment records, such as attendance, internal assessment, and assignment records, are also available on the college website.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

K Shroff & Co.) conducts a quarterly audit of its books and accounts, as well as bank statement reconciliation. At the end of the financial year, the external auditors finalize the accounts and prepare the balance sheet. The same is presented to the Governing Body by the Principal for its necessary ratification.

Environmental Studies is a core paper taught across all courses. 7.1.7 Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

Some green initiatives taken up by the Institute are listed below:

- 1. The institution is well maintained and well-kept. This is accomplished by a fleet of full-time housekeeping employees working under the supervision of the maintenance supervisor. Cleaning is carried out on a daily basis.
- 2. Thirty kWp Solar PV plant has been installed at the roof top of Main Campus. During the session July 2017 to June 2018, 17487 kwh was produced, 1895 kwh of power was injected and 16092 kwh of power consumed.
- 3. The Nature Club maintains the campus's greenery, including a vertical garden and a kitchen garden at the Main campus.
- 4. A buy-back programme is used to replace computer hardware.
- 5. Other furniture and recyclable waste is sold to a reputable scrap recycling company, and the proceeds are deposited in the Accounts office.
- 6. Dustbins are placed at every required place at the college campus and they are emptied on a daily basis. Garbage, is collected at college's rear side and removed by Kolkata Municipal Corporation.
- 7. Teachers and students are encouraged to re-purpose rejected materials in an effective and appealing manner. The NSS (Science) collaborated with the Interior Designing Department to create a garden out of recycled waste goods such as drums, scooters, hospital stands, nuts & bolts, metal chips, and so on.
- 8. A sanitary napkin incinerator has been installed in one of the college's washrooms for all female students and staff.
- 9. Several awareness banners on energy conservation are displayed classroom and on hygiene in the restrooms.

BEST PRACTICE-1

Title of the Practice: Industry Institute Interface

Objective: The major goal was to create and maintain partnerships with the corporate world through MoUs, industrial visits, seminars & conferences, workshops, career counseling sessions, special lectures and in-plant training programs for students.

Context: The Institute has always made an effort to engage with a variety of industries since it is critical for ensuring that theory meets practise in all functional areas. Interaction at such forums enables students to understand the expectations and skill-set required by the different industries. At the same time, it enables industry personal to interact with students and

understand their learning outcomes for the purpose of future employment.

Practice: In order to strengthen the Industry Institution Interaction and to achieve academic outcomes, several initiatives across following dimensions were taken:

- Internships were organized for B.Sc, BBA, M.Sc, M.Com & PGDDAN students at 168 different organizations.
- MoU was signed between the college and Avinashilingam Institute for Home Science and Higher Education for Women, Coimbatore (Tamil Nadu) on mutual interest in the field of education & research and to foster collaborative activity for research & student exchange. Under this agreement, six M.Sc. (Textiles & Clothing) students attended a 10-day training programme on Fabric Production at Coimbatore.
- Each department of the college organized national level seminars/conferences on current and new age topics through association with Industry Forums and/or by inviting experts from the industry as resource persons.

 - Fifty-nine special lectures on a range of topics involving some external experts and resource persons from industry were organized by all the departments in order to enrich and enhance learning of students.
 - Fifty-seven field visits to industries and NGOs were undertaken by students to enhance their critical thinking and supplement their theoretical knowledge.
 - Sixteen career counselling sessions conducted by the industry experts were organized to impart career guidance to students.

Evidence of Success: The number of activities conducted by the institute, as well as the impressive participation and satisfaction by students and staff indicates the evidence of success.

BEST PRACTICE-2

8 Future Plans of action for next academic year (500 words)

Students' admission and enrolment: J D Birla Institute plans for the admission of the under graduate and post graduate batches well in advance so that the seats do not remain vacant. The focus is on making school students who are in senior classes aware about the courses we offer and the opportunities associated with the said courses. This is all the more important for our Science departments because the subjects offered are application oriented and may not be well known to the general student body.

Faculty research and publication: The faculty members are routinely motivated to carry out research work and publish papers in UGC approved journals. Incentives include cash awards

and certificates and the fact that the faculty published papers will be considered for their career advancement and promotion.

Increasing the availability of learning resources: J D Birla Institute will encourage all faculty members to recommend relevant books and other learning resources to be added to the Learning Resource Centres (library), both for the Main Campus (Departments of science and Commerce) and the Satellite Campus (department of Management). The students can also recommend books for buying.
